

Patrick Broderick discusses the works with a visitor to the exhibit.



Fototeca and the National Gallery. Reviews have also been extremely favourable.

"We felt that this would be a wonderful project to get involved with," explains Mrs Bigelman, director of the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands. "Not only are the images beautiful in themselves but they help us each to better understand our own neighbours. Our countries are so close, yet we know so little about each other. We felt that this was an opportunity to begin the learning process."

These sentiments were echoed by Mr. Broderick "I am very happy that the Cuban people have been positively receptive to my pictures as this is my interpretation of their culture and life. Coupled with by statement it is amazing how many people have come and told me that they have been positively touched by the exhibition. Throughout the entire process of recording Cuba it was my intention to try and capture its real essence, which is undoubtedly in the people. It is the people who make the difference here."

Mr. Broderick has recently been selected as one of ten photographers from the Caribbean region to exhibit 50 images of his work at the Festival of the Caribbean's Gallery of History in July 2004.
