exhibition now showing at the National Gallery.


The show, called Two

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winning photographer has several books to his name. In all, Mr. Salas spent about two weeks in Grand Cayman to prepare for the exhibition.

Both photographers contributed about 30 images each to the show. Mr. Salas dwelt on what he believes to be the cultural soul of the island: its old people, and the environment. Hence, in of many photographs, portraits of elderly folk have been superimposed images of such natural phenomena as scallop shells and big, smooth chunks of coralstone.

Mr. Broderick has some interesting shots of rural Cuba and its l a n d - w o r k i n g inhabitants, as well as urban images, which capture glorious colonial architecture as well as modern edifices, and the expressions of young and old as they go about their daily lives.

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The exhibit is open 9am-5pm, Monday to Friday, and 11am-4pm on Saturdays.
