Artist's Statement:

Artist's Statement:

Fine art photography has been his area of special interest for the past three years. Justin represented the Cayman Islands at Carifesta 2003, and he serves regularly on local exhibition juries.

Artist's Statement:

Force: an influence tending to change the motion of a body or produce motion or stress in a stationary body.

Nature: the phenomena of the physical world collectively, including plants, animals and the landscape, as opposed to humans or human creations * the physical force regarded as causing and regulating these phenomena.

Such a diverse category as "Forces of Nature" should have created a multitude of thoughts and emotions and the manifestation of such into physical expression. Yet, when absorbing the different meanings submerged in the definitions above, there was an underlying current pulling at my subconscious, guiding my thoughts through a mental thermocline and into conscious realization. As random thoughts surfaced the one connecting element was water, the force of nature which has influenced and steered my life.

Each photograph represents a time in my life, some of major significance, others just flotsam and jetsam left behind as markers of times past. Yet, in each, there is a connecting bond, not just the bond between hydrogen and oxygen, but also the bond that connects life's navigation with this photographer: Water.
