Street art exhibit lends a voice

As street art becomes more popular with the art community in Cayman, the National Gallery of the Cayman Islands is preparing to present a variety of contemporary street art in its upcoming exhibition titled Up and Out.

The exhibition represents a compilation of work created by the Gallery's outreach participants under the guidance of the Gallery's Education and Outreach Coordinator, Jessica Wallace, and programme instructors. At present the Gallery facilitates eight art outreach programmes, with participants ranging in age from 13 to 60.

Up and Out aims to be an intense expression of artistic statements and murals voicing social issues that the artists face in Cayman. The genre of street art provides a unique and uninhibited outlet in which artists can deal with and bring awareness to social justice issues that they are facing.

moved from its humble beginnings as illegal scratchings to producing renowned street artists, famous for their public expression and artistic style.



Additionally, interested teens who want to learn more about the Street Art medium, can attend a Gallery workshop on Saturday, 5 December where they will learn the techniques of Street Art including stencilling and spray painting. At the end of the day, participants will have created an art piece showing off the methods learned throughout the day's class.
