National Gallery of the Cayman Islands Presents



10 September - 5 November 2015 | Curated by Natalie Urquhart

Up until a few decades ago the Cayman Islands existed as a hard-working, conservative frontier society, carving out an existence from seafaring, turtling and other maritime activities. Today, this way of life has changed beyond recognition, driven initially by the growing affluence generated during the Southwell Years, and later the growth of the financial and tourism industries; a shift that has had enormous repercussions on our islands' wider culture, its expressions and material testimony.

Each of the artists featured in this exhibition were invited to consider the impact that this rapid socio-cultural transformation has had on their sense of self, and on the wider concepts of national identity. Some create from a deeply introspective viewpoint via explorations of memory, family, language and personal mythologies, while others address the wider, often highly contested, notions of immigration, political status, ethnicity and race, rights of citizenship, development, and the erosion of tradition. Collectively these works offer a critical space through which to begin articulating what it truly means to be "of" these islands in the 21st century.

The exhibition features large-scale installations, sculpture, painting, new media and multi-disciplinary work, digital art, video and large- format photographs, in addition to an off-site public art project. About the Panelists

Holly Bynoe is a curator, visual artist and writer from St. Vincent and the Grenadines. She is currently living and working in Nassau, Bahamas. Bynoe is the co-founder and director of *ARC Magazine*, a premiere visual art and culture publication focusing on contemporary work created throughout the Caribbean and its diaspora. She is a graduate of Bard College | International Center of Photography where she earned an MFA in Advanced Photographic Studies (2010).

As editor and director of *ARC Magazine*, Bynoe has organised and curated various exhibitions across the Caribbean and the diaspora in collaboration with several formal and informal art spaces including trinidad+tobago film festival, VOLTA NY, The Fresh Milk Art Platform Inc. and Transforming Spaces among others. She is co-director of Caribbean Linked, a regional residency program in Aruba, advisor to the Davidoff Art Initiative, and co-director of Tilting Axis, a biannual meeting charting arts activism and non-profit models of connectivity and sustainability across the region. She is currently conducting research on interdisciplinary practices across the global Caribbean with a focus on new media and photographic practices.

She has recently been appointed chief curator of the National Art Gallery of the Bahamas (NAGB).

Amanda Coulson is a Bahamian/American art critic and curator based in Nassau on the island of New Providence, where she is currently director of the National Art Gallery of The Bahamas.

Coulson studied for her Master's Degree at the Institute of Fine Arts, NYU and after working in various galleries in New York, Paris and London, she started her critical career in Milan where she spent 2 years as English Language Editor of the international edition of tema celeste magazine. She has written for a variety of art journals, including *Frieze*, *Frieze* d/e, *Modern Painters*, *Contemporary*, *Lápiz*, *Art Review and ARTnews*.

In 2005, she was one of the co-founders of the VOLTA fair in Basel, Switzerland. Acting as executive director since 2007 she oversaw the growth and development of the fair, including conceiving the solo show idea for the inaugural edition of VOLTA NY in 2008.
